Character—One Person Can Make a Difference

1. The student will develop a deeper understanding of the strengths and behaviors of a volunteer.

- 2. The student will read and discuss a story about a volunteer who made a difference.
- 3. The student will complete a news article.

Book: <u>Miss Rumphius</u> by Barbara Cooney (Other possibilities: <u>Adventures of Sparrow Boy</u> by Pickney, <u>Good People Everywhere</u> by Gillen, <u>Kindness to Share from A to Z</u> by Snow, <u>Ordinary Mary's Extraordinary Deed</u> by Pearson, <u>Picture Book of Rosa Parks</u> by Adler, or <u>Ruby Bridges</u> by Cole)

Teacher Instructions:

- 1. Have students choose one (or more) of the above videos to watch.
- 2. Discuss ways to make the community a better place. Read <u>Miss Rumphius</u> (or one of the other books). Discuss the way the character changed her/his world.
- 3. Discuss any challenges the character faced, the successes the character had, the strengths of the character, how they would feel if they did what the character did, and what other next steps the character could take
- 4. Have students write a short news story describing the who, what, where, when, and why of the character's accomplishment.

Extension Activities: For younger grades, read <u>Have You Filled a Bucket Today</u> by McCloud. Draw a picture of a way to fill a bucket. For older grades, read a biography about Mother Theresa. Write about how she changed the world.

Assessment/Evaluation Option

Make a rubric with who, what, where, when, and why sections and check that each part is included in the news article written.
